The area of language and mathematics had the lowest percent of children meeting or exceeding expectations. Professional Development for the 2024-25 school year will include the process for referring children for speech services and including language and mathematic strategies and activities from Teaching Strategies. It should also include some transitions to use to help embed these strategies throughout the day.

2023-2024 Child Outcomes:

The percentage of preschoolers who met or exceeded expectations on GOLD assessments from Fall 2023 to Spring 2024.

Social Emotional: 37% (Fall) to 96%(spring)

Physical: 59% (fall) to 98% (spring) Language: 78% (fall) to 94% (spring) Cognitive: 36% (fall) to 98% (spring) Literacy: 33% (fall) to 95% (spring) Mathematics: 21% (fall) to 89% (spring)

The biggest improvements were in Social-Emotional, Mathematics, and Cognitive Expectations. The least amount of improvement was in Language although it did start as one of the highest in the fall at 78%.

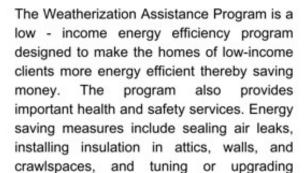

However, he left after seven months, which limited our ability to weatherize homes in our service area. Fortunately, as we enter FY24, we have two motivated individuals in training to become Auditors/Inspectors, and we're excited about the prospect of weatherizing many homes in the year ahead.





OUTREACH CENTERS

Volunteer (Taylor County)

This program is funded through lowa DHHS in Taylor County which provides friendly visiting, indirect services, and payee services to DHHS referred clients who are often elderly and handicapped individuals. This helps these individuals stay in their home with some outside assistance. Program ended June 30, 2023.

WIC/CAH

Child and Adolescent Health (CAH)

The CAH program strives to ensure that children receive periodic comprehensive health screening services that include dental screening and education, immunization, and developmental/behavioral screening.

The CAH program also provides presumptive eligibility services for children who may appear to be eligible for Medicaid or Hawki, informing services for children who are newly Medicaid enrolled, care coordination ser-vices to help family's access regular health care check-ups for their children through medical and dental homes, and links families to other community-based services based upon needs.

1st Five

Public-private partnership bridging primary care and public health services. 1st Five sup-ports health providers in earlier detection of social, emotional and developmental delays and family risk-related factors in children birth to 5, and also coordinates referrals, interventions and follow-up.

Child Care Nurse Consultants (CCNC)

73.07%

(95 out of 130) of Early Child Education programs in Collaborative Service Area 9 participate with the CCNCs.

Hawki

Designed to provide affordable health insurance to uninsured or underinsured working families.



WIC/CAH

I-Smile

Designed to ensure dental access to all children regardless of insurance cover.

Women, Infant, and Children Program (WIC)

WIC services include: nutrition education, health screenings and referrals, supplemental food assistance, and food packages tailored by dietitian to meet specific need of each in-dividual. WIC is designed to serve: pregnant women, post-partum women, nursing moms, infants and children 0-5.
